## <u>Pastor's Meditation – March 2024</u> <u>Papa "O"</u>

Today my thoughts wander toward "Papa O." I'll leave out his real name to protect the innocent. He supervised college students like me in the Maintenance Department at my

college. I worked two years with him, including summers, but knew him long before that. Some of my earliest memories are of grocery shopping with Mom in a local store, where he worked. Back then, he was just "Mr. O.". He managed that well-run store from an elevated booth that gave him a full view of most of the aisles. Under his leadership, the store met with Mom's strong standards for cleanliness and value. Each time we shopped, my siblings and I would wave at and call out Mr. O., who also attended our church.

Having succeeded as a store manager, he took a risk, starting his own business in the 1970s. He opened a convenience-type market, which unfortunately went under. By the time I was in college, he had become known as "Papa O." He was scrambling to finish out his career and afford retirement. He and his good-natured wife had full-time jobs at the college. He also had a second job as a local school bus driver. Once, while I was up at 5am finishing papers, I looked out the dorm window to see his car parked at one of the buildings. Here he was in his late 50s, doing maintenance chores in the middle of the night before heading to the bus garage. I had been feeling self-pity for all the schoolwork, but then I saw what his life was like.

Near the end of Senior Year, at 5:30 one Sunday morning, he knocked on my door. I opened it to find him holding a bucket and a mop. "Somebody spread limburger cheese all over the bathrooms. You gotta get that cleaned up before everyone starts using them." It took over an hour, but I somehow managed to clean them without throwing up, although a residual smell lingered for months. (I figured out it was a Senior prank by one of my female classmates. She later confessed and we are on good terms today.)

I guess Papa O either liked my work or liked me, maybe both. He started talking with me frequently. He opened up about his life and times. He blamed the store's failure on his decision to set aside his beliefs and sell alcohol and tobacco, both of which he never used and strongly opposed. If I had known anything about anything, I might've argued with him; maybe discussed '70s stagflation or differing views about alcohol and tobacco, but it didn't matter. Papa O was convinced. In his eyes, he had gone outside of his values. He was not true to himself and his faith, and that's why his business failed. Theologians have written volumes about why bad things happen to good people, and many would disagree with his spiritual explanation for something that went bad, but ultimately, it was up to him to discern what the Holy Spirit was saying. I guess it's up to all of us. If I were speaking with him today, I'd accept his views, while talking about the Grace of Jesus Christ, who forgives even our worst failings.

Honestly, I've forgotten (maybe repressed) what limburger cheese smells like. But I won't forget Papa O, contemplating spiritual causes for his successes and failures. He

encouraged me to learn from his life and never compromise my values in the pursuit of money. That lesson, unlike the smell of limburger, stayed with me.

Papa O lived until he was 83 years old. Unfortunately, we lost touch after he retired. Health concerns eventually led him to a well-run retirement home for the rest of his days. I imagine him in eternity, resting from his labors and enjoying the Love of his Savior, who showed him the ultimate meaning of things. Through life's successes and failures, the grace of Jesus covered him.

During March the Missions Team will be presenting the America for Christ (AFC) Offering, one of the 4 annual offerings of the American Baptist Churches-USA. The theme this year is **Grace Upon Grace**, reminding us that we have all received one gracious blessing after another. The donations to this offering allow the American Baptist Home Missions Society (ABHMS) to provide financial support to American Baptist Churches and affiliated organizations across the United States and Puerto Rico. Nearly 1/3

of the funds that are donated are returned to the regional office of the local church - that for us would be the ABC-USA Rochester-Genesee Region, directed by Reverend Dr. Sandra Hasenauer who spoke about their work in our community at a 2nd Hour program here last fall. Bringing "healing and hope" to communities can mean food for hungry children and adults, literacy programs, services for senior citizens, training leaders, and much more. In general it is bringing relief to struggling neighbors who need to be helped, comforted and reminded that God sees their struggle and cares about them.

Our Spring Into Action food drive for the Penfield Ecumenical Food Shelf this year is Saturday, March 2nd from 10 A.M. - Noon in the church parking lot. The items that are needed for Easter meals this year are Jello, Brownie Mixes, Applesauce (no glass please). We greatly appreciate how generously the congregation partners with us on this project.

Our team was also in contact with **The Shepherd Home** in February to support them in advance of the February Flapjack Breakfast. The Featured Charity for the March Flapjack Breakfast will be **Penfield Hope**. In the same manner, the Missions Team will be working with that organization so that they can encourage participation at the breakfast.

At the annual business meeting of January 12, 1917 the following plan was unanimously carried: "That members of churches of denominations other than Baptist, in good and regular standing, be received upon acceptance of their letter and be accorded all the privileges of other members, their letters to be held by us until letters of dismissal shall be asked for, then to be returned to them together with letter of recommendation to the society with which they wish to unite". Previously, baptism by immersion had been required for membership.
